


No doubt coming to church at some point to ponder on and celebrate Jesus' birth is on your list too as something that will bring you joy. We have plenty of opportunities to do this in





Encountering God on a Greek mountain

Interfaith Week (9–16 November) was an

opportunity to share stories and experiences that bring people together. One recent journey did just that: a pilgrimage to Mount Athos in Greece, organised by Bishop Richard and co-led by Father Ioan Nazarcu, Priest of Romanian Orthodox Congregations in Luton and Bedford.

The Revd Martin Watson, curate at St Paul's, St Albans, was among the group and described it as "a once in a lifetime pilgrimage to the Holy Island of Mount Athos."

For three days in mid-October, Martin joined seven others, along with Fr Ioan and Bishop Richard, on a journey to Mount Athos, a self-governing monastic community two hours from Thessaloniki as part of our Year of



Spiritual Renewal and Wellbeing. Known as the Holy Mountain, it is home to 20 large Orthodox monasteries, countless smaller communities, and hermits who live in solitude. Pilgrims are strictly limited, and access is by ferry only.

"Mount Athos... is dedicated to Mary, the Mother of Jesus. It Continued on next page was a real privilege to be able to visit the Mountain, a limited number of pilgrims are allowed each day and access is by ferry only."


The adventure began in Thessaloniki, where the group visited two cathedrals before heading to the port of Ouranoupoli. Martin recalls the drive:

"For me, most of the journey was spent in prayer as Father Ioan drove us to the port living out his rally driver dream as he did so!"

After a seafood feast and a good night's sleep, the pilgrims boarded the ferry and stepped into a world steeped in centuries of devotion. Over two days, they visited six monasteries and stayed overnight in two: one Greekspeaking and one Romanian-speaking.

"We saw some incredible things, beautiful churches decorated with the most vivid images, thousands of icons, the most ornate decorations and some incredible relics all pointing back to God."

The services were long – sometimes three hours – and



"Yes the style of worship was very different to what we were used to, yes the services were difficult to follow but above it all it was clear that God was there, the same God that we worship in our services at home was there on the Mountain."

Hospitality was another highlight:

"We were welcomed in like old friends and made to feel at home."

Reflecting on the pilgrimage, Martin concludes:

"The dedication to worship and the service of God from the monks was inspiring. It was a joy to be able to spend time in God's presence in this most beautiful of places."

Bishop Richard shared about the experience:

"Pilgrimage is always about more than the journey itself. It is about opening ourselves to encounter God in unexpected places, whether in a Greek monastery or in the quiet of our daily lives. I rejoice that those who travelled this particular journey have returned with renewed faith and fresh vision."

Sharing stories like Martin's helps us appreciate the many ways faith is lived and expressed. Whether through dialogue, hospitality, or the simple act of learning from one another, these encounters deepen understanding and strengthen the bonds that hold communities together.

Tales from a Sabbatical II – Places

Last month I wrote about some of the projects I saw during my month in London volunteering with LCM. This month I'm going to write about the various places I visited across the whole 3 months of my Sabbatical.

Ibegan by driving down to north Devon, to a beautiful Retreat centre called Lee Abbey, on the coast near Lynton and Lynmouth. It was built in c1850 but was never actually an Abbey; it became a retreat centre in 1946 and since then has been home to a Christian community, and host to many guests – among them me! I was booked onto a silent retreat – from 8pm on Monday to 5pm on Thursday we smiled at each other but didn't speak, companions at meals and at our daily meeting at 10am when we listened to our retreat leader and were led in reflection. The rest of the time there was the countryside and the sea, time to think and pray and rest; it was only when I got there that I realised just how tired I was, and I left feeling refreshed and cared for.

It was quite a contrast to arrive in London a week or so later, with the noise, the traffic, the bustle and the people. I was based in East London: street after street of terraced houses. leading off busy High Streets with many shops selling unfamiliar (to me) food, and beautiful Asian clothing. quickly became adept at using the 'Citymapper' app on my phone to find my way by bus and / or tube to wherever I was due each day, remembering to 'tap on' and 'tap off' every time. I went to the LCM headquarters a few times, which involved a tube journey and then a walk past the Tower of London and across Tower Bridge, with views of the city and the river that I loved. Sometimes my travels took me on the Docklands Light Railway, which passes London City Airport, and it was fascinating to watch the occasional plane land or take off so close by. At the end of July and beginning of August I spent 2 weeks in Cambridge –a very different city. I was attending a Summer School doing some theology and biblical languages study, and staying at Westminster College which is in the north west of the city. The College was only a short walk from the city centre, where I saw beautiful historic buildings and colleges, many tourists! (but no students as it was not term-time), and of course the river Cam where some new friends from the summer school and I enjoyed a punting trip. The studying itself was hard work! Each week we had 5 lectures each on various aspects of the Old and New Testaments – I found the teaching on Psalms and on the disciples in the Gospels and Acts very interesting, but was less engaged by lectures on the decolonisation of New Testament studies (once I had begun to understand what that meant). I also dipped into Biblical Hebrew and New Testament Greek, both of which I experienced a little of when Tim was doing his ordination training, and was pleased to find that I hadn't completely forgotten it all.

In between these three sections of my sabbatical time, Tim and I had a short break on the south coast, and a longer holiday near Durham including a rather chilly visit to Scarborough where we paddled in the sea briefly! I also was able to spend a couple of weekends in south London with my mother, which we both enjoyed very much.

Being a pastor in the Ukraine

Pastors in the Ukraine are continuing to minister to their beleaguered congregations, bringing comfort and hope into the most frightening and desperate war-torn situations.

So says Transform Europe Network, a Christian ministry which serves alongside indigenous Christians in Eastern Europe and the Balkans. In a recent report, it gives an update from one of its partners on the ground:

"Pastor Evgeniy serves in the war-torn Kherson region of southeastern Ukraine. Since 2022, he and a small group of volunteers have brought food, comfort, and hope to people living amid the destruction.

"Evgeniy and his team recently came to a village that had been shelled. One family's home was reduced to rubble, and their vital documents were buried. The team arrived in bright, civilian clothing, deliberately chosen to identify them as volunteers, not military. As they began to pull back the rubble, they remained calm, focussing on their priority to help the family escape.

"40 minutes later, the volunteers heard and saw a reconnaissance drone circling above them. They couldn't tell who it belonged to, but its presence was ominous. Then came a different sound — sharper, lower, and closer. A small military drone was heading straight for them. In a moment that could only be described as divine intervention, the drone clipped a tree branch and crashed to the ground next to the team's car.

"The team cautiously approached the drone, still twitching and sparking. Minutes later, a second drone appeared. It aimed for the fallen drone, possibly to trigger an explosion by striking the first. But it too missed its target—crashing about six meters from the car, hitting a nearby concrete wall rather than the group. No one was injured:-

"But the volunteers knew then that they were under attack. They gathered their tools, helped the family into the vehicle, and drove away. Just seconds after they left, a third drone struck — right where their car had been parked moments before. The resulting explosion could have easily taken their lives. But once again, by what they all believe was God's hand, they were spared.

"Reflecting on the events, Pastor Evgeniy was asked if he ever felt hatred or the desire for revenge. His answer was quiet, but unshakable

'No. I just understand. I understand the pain. I understand the fear. But if we don't bring light into this darkness, who will?'

"For Evgeniy, war is not a reason to harden the heart—it's a call to deeper compassion. Even as drones fly overhead and homes crumble, he continues his ministry, bringing food, prayer, and humanity into places others flee from.

"This is what faith looks like in the ruins. It looks like a small group in bright vests, carrying hope into danger. It looks like a pastor who chooses grace over vengeance. And it looks like a God who protects, even when the bombs fall close."

Since the talks involving the US and a possible ceasefire, the local leaders testify that instead of de-escalation, they've experienced a significant rise in attacks and shelling.

Transform Europe Network (TEN) asks Christians in the UK:

Please pray for pastors and church teams, exhausted by serving many people on the frontline.

Pray for those who are confused, discouraged and angry, even with each other. Pray for healing and comfort from the Holy Spirit. Churches in Ukraine do all they can to reconcile local people, but it is getting harder and harder.

Mothers are afraid that their teenage sons will be taken away for conscription, which has become increasingly aggressive. This also causes men to run away from home and so many families are fractured and deeply stressed as the war grinds on.







Canon Paul Hardingham continues his series on the books of the Bible.

What's the Big Idea? An Introduction to Books of the New Testament: Philippians

This letter was written to Christians in the Macedonian city of Philippi when Paul was in prison, probably in Rome (60-62 AD). His primary purpose in writing was to thank them for the gift they had sent him upon learning of his imprisonment. However, he also uses the letter as an opportunity to report on his situation; to encourage the Philippians to stand firm in the face of persecution and rejoice regardless of circumstances; to exhort the church to live in humility, fellowship, and unity; to commend Epaphroditus and Timothy to them; and to warn them about false teaching. This included Judaizers who were persuading the Philippians to submit to circumcision.

The central message of Philippians focuses on joy (the word occurs some 16 times!). For Paul, joy isn't simply an emotional response to favourable circumstances. True joy is to be found through a relationship with the resurrected and glorified Christ. Death ceases to be an enemy, because through it we can more fully enjoy the presence of Jesus. This joy is also rooted in an expectation of the return of Jesus, which gives urgency to the task of sharing the gospel. So, Paul begins his letter by thanking the Philippians for their partnership together in the work of the gospel through the offerings they have sent.

Paul also powerfully appeals to the Philippians to be of 'one mind' in pursuing humility and unity. He gives the example

of Jesus himself 'who made himself nothing, taking the very nature of a servant' (2:7) to the point of dying the death of a common criminal. 'Therefore', say Paul, 'God exalted him to the highest place' (2:9). This 'Jesus attitude' is the one that all believers should share.

Christmas Unwrapped!

All of us have received unwanted gifts at Christmas. For Joseph the gift of a child, as recorded in Matthew chapter 1, was not something he really wanted. Although he was engaged to Mary, her pregnancy would be grounds for divorce. Not surprisingly, with the associated social disgrace, Joseph wanted to divorce Mary quietly (Matthew 1:19). However, God intervened in a dream: 'The virgin will be with child and will give birth to a son, and they will call Him Immanuel, which means, God with us.' (1:23). In a scary and uncertain world, what does the message of Immanuel say to us today?

God is present with us

God assured Joseph that He was working in all that Joseph was going through. The eternal and creator God entered time and space as a baby. This baby is both uniquely divine but also fully human. This means that we can know God personally, not just know about Him. The Holy Spirit is committed to making Jesus' life and character real in us, and bringing meaning to our circumstances, just as He worked in Mary's life.

God is on our side

Christmas touches some raw nerves in our lives, including

stress, family rows, loneliness and financial pressures. However, God does not remain aloof from our experiences. In Jesus He enters our world of hopes and fears, joys and disappointments. He understands what we are going through, as He is alongside us. By the cross and resurrection, He gave His life that we might know His love, joy, peace and forgiveness.

For Joseph, as well as us, the Christmas message is one of hope in an uncertain world. It is a time to re-consider the claims of *Immanuel* ('*God with us*') as we entrust ourselves to Him for the coming year.

This Christmas, will you have enough?

At the opening of Bach's Cantata No, 82 a solo bass voice begins to sing the aria 'Ich habe genug'- (I have enough) - a paraphrase of Simeon's Song 'Now Lord, lettest thou thy servant depart in peace... for mine eyes have seen thy salvation.'.

Simeon - the bass voice - realises that he is complete, he has enough, now he has beheld the infant Jesus, even though our salvation has yet to be completed in the adult Christ. Bach's paraphrase, slow and meditative, takes, as it were, the words out of Simeon's mouth into the witness of the singer, reminding all who listen that this is a timeless truth: in Christ I have enough.

The rest of the cantata - another four movements covering a

total of about 25 minutes - takes up the theme of longing to being united fully with Christ. That is enough, that is completion.

Enough. Complete. These words probably rarely fall from our lips as an experienced truth, either in relation to what we have, what we want, and importantly, who we are. And yet we've assented to this concept of the all-sufficiency of God in countless hymns that we've sung Sunday by Sunday since, well.... forever. Christ 'my all in all'.

At best it remains an aspiration, for we live at a time when the whole weight of our culture is to divert our baptism promises, our reliance on God into reliance on *stuff*, gewgaws in infinite variety.

No more so than at Christmas, when we are urged to splurge, and then splurge some more. 'Is this present good enough for our Joe? Maybe I should buy him something else as well.... And do you think a turkey *and* beef will be enough? Maybe another two dozen pigs in blankets?'

I'm not trying to be a kill-joy here. Our best times are around food, with friends, and Christmas is the one time of the year that we make an effort to be with friends and family. But the whole of so-called western civilisation is posited on the fact that we have to have more, and it reaches its anxious climax at Christmas.

Any advert you happen to catch will convince you of this truth; western capitalism depends on **you** buying stuff, needed or not.
