# Catherine's Column

#### From the Vicarage

Did you know Sunday 8th May is a special day?

It's the 4th Sunday of Easter, which means it is Good Shepherd Sunday, so called because we hear Jesus' words in John 10 where he says 'I am the Good Shepherd'. But what did he mean by

There is a funny YouTube clip which demonstrates how tricky shepherding can be. A sheep is stuck in a deep, narrow crack in the earth, with just its back legs sticking out. The shepherd manages to grab one of the legs and, after much effort, pulls it out. Without any acknowledgement of its rescuer, off skips the sheep joyfully... only for it to fall headfirst back into the ditch literally seconds later! No doubt the shepherd dutifully rescued the sheep again, patiently and lovingly, but with a knowing smile on his face.

Sheep are curious, joyful creatures, but also prone to distractions and scrapes and notoriously not very clever! Dangers lie all around - thickets, ditches, predators and more - which is why they need a shepherd to protect, guard and guide them in the right direction. One of our sons raised some lambs one year in partnership with a friend – it was hard work getting up to feed them before work, especially when it was cold, dark and wet, but they had fun (and we enjoyed some delicious lamb!). However, he often came home with tales of the daft things the lambs or their mothers had done, and how

that?

they had needed to be sorted out.

We can be very much like sheep sometimes, with many distractions to take us off the path of discipleship, and many dangers and difficulties we can get stuck in. Which is why we need Jesus as our shepherd. And Jesus is the Good Shepherd, whose love for us is so strong that he 'laid down his life for the sheep' (John 10: 15) as we remembered on Good Friday.

But as well as Good Shepherd Sunday, the fourth Sunday of Easter is also Vocations Sunday, when we are reminded that all the members of Jesus' flock share a common vocation - to love and follow our Good Shepherd who can keep us safely on the right track.

We all have our own individual vocations to follow too – often we think of Christian vocations as solely concerned with ordination, but God calls us to serve him in different ways in the places he leads us to. In our workplace or school, in the organisations we're part of, in our local community, and of course in our churches, we need to be listening to hear what our Good Shepherd is calling us to do as part of his purposes for our lives.

As that funny video reminded me, as Jesus' sheep we can so often wander off course and find ourselves in sticky situations! But the Good Shepherd will always be ready to help set us right again. Just keep listening to his voice, for he knows where we need to go.

Jesus said, 'My sheep hear my voice. I know them, and they follow me' (John 10: 27).

Archbishop Justin Welby's Easter sermon received widespread media attention for better or worse. Less well known is his letter to partners and heads of churches around the world. As we continue the Easter season you may care to reflect upon this. Ed

"Early on the first day of the week, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene came to the tomb and saw that the stone had been removed from the tomb" [John 20:1]

This Easter we turn once again towards the light of Jesus Christ, the Prince of Peace, in a world marked by darkness and conflict. For some of our churches, Easter has long been celebrated in the shadow of war and instability. For others, this may be the first time in many decades that the resurrection and promise of Christ has been celebrated amidst the cruel reality of bloodshed, displacement and struggle.

We pray particularly for those suffering in Ukraine this Easter, as well as the many other places that face war and conflict across the world. We pray for the widows of Yemen, the orphaned of Ethiopia and those from Afghanistan who are facing famine or have become foreigners in search of safety. We hold before God the countless other places across the world where such deep suffering is seen and grieved by Him who knows our pain on the Cross. We also remember those suffering the ongoing effects of the pandemic, and our brothers and sisters across the world who face the grave and present threat of the climate crisis.

In this broken world, the way of the Cross is a calling to each

of us. The foot of the Cross becomes a place to gather as one body and one people, facing different sufferings but united in our need for God's healing and transformation.

We see in the wounds of humanity the risen Christ who still bears the scars of crucifixion. We see in the costly, sacrificial generosity of churches in Europe and around the world the redeeming promise of our Lord. In their support and hospitality in times of need, we see the Christ who is our refuge and our strength.

We give thanks to God for those religious leaders who have reached out to refugees and spoken out against evil, even at great personal danger to themselves and we are reminded that our fellowship in the Gospel when we speak and act together is more powerful than any wickedness.

For these signs of great hope, we give thanks. We celebrate life conquering death, wherever and whenever we see it.

Our calling this Easter remains the same as Christ's call to his disciples: to be people who witness to the resurrection. When we, too, see and believe (John 20:9), we can be bringers of new life. We too are called to stand with the oppressed, the marginalised and the forgotten. We too are called to cry out for God's justice and mercy to prevail, to denounce injustice and reject inequality in all the ways they appear in our world.

In St John's Gospel, Jesus appears to a mourning woman and she is consoled. His beloved disciple, fearful and confused, sees and believes. Thomas doubts, and yet in the wounds of Jesus he finds the truth of Christ. Jesus welcomes those without status and without value in the eyes of the world. God's message is made known to the wounded, the grieving, the confused, the rejected.

We have a saviour who does not turn his back on suffering and

scarring, but bears it all, and so transforms it.

While it was still dark and all seemed hopeless on the first Easter Sunday, Jesus had already risen. Death had already been defeated. And the first day of God's new creation had already begun. May we each hear the wounded yet risen Christ call us by name this Easter, and may we greet him with joy on this new dawn of God's creation.

Alleluia! Christ is risen indeed!

#### Giving Campaign 2022: the outcomes!

It was so encouraging to know that so many people took time to pray and review their giving to their Church during our Giving Campaign in March. **Thank you** to everyone who did this – and if you haven't yet returned your form and wish to do so, it is not too late! We are very grateful to God for inspiring and prompting so many of us during this time.

The responses received reflected great generosity and willingness to support each of our Parish Churches in their ministry and mission, and as a result we have new offers of time and skills to help in various areas, increased financial giving from some regular donors, and a number of new regular financial givers – this will all make a huge difference to our churches.

As well as promised giving increasing (*don't forget to do any* paperwork required to set up/increase your regular gift!),

fundraising activities should be back to more normal levels this year, and this too is an important income stream for all the churches.

**Thank you** for responding to God's generosity to you, and for your gifts to your church. And praise God for all that he is doing in and among us and our villages.

#### **Finance details**


**St Leonard's**: gained 2 new regular givers, and 2 existing givers increased their monthly gift – all of which will help to meet rising costs of the ministry and of maintaining the ancient building (actual figures not available at time of going to print).

**St Owen's**: 8 new regular givers, together with those who increased their regular giving, made £724 extra income each month, expected to be just over £900 a month when Gift Aid is added, covering about 50% of the gap we face.


**St Mary's**: 3 new regular givers, and others raising their giving, amounts to £253 additional income per month; plus Gift Aid where applicable of approximately £50, totals around £300 per month – this will cover about 33% of the projected annual shortfall.

Graphical representations of projected incomes are shown opposite.

FINALLY - thank you to our three Treasurers for all their work on our behalf keeping the accounts in order, and especially to Emma (Bromham) and Sally (Oakley) for their invaluable contributions of time and skills to the Giving Campaign. **Bromham** Projected Annual Income (below) - showing gap across 12 months reduced by about half following the Giving Campaign (in 2022 we will benefit from 8 not 12 months of increased giving so the gap will be slightly larger).



**Oakley** Projected Annual Income (below) – also showing the effect of a full year of increased giving reducing the gap in our income by a third.

#### Christian Basics No 5: Understanding the Bible

The Bible is a popular book, with five billion copies sold worldwide every year, as well as a uniquely precious book. At her coronation the Queen was given a Bible, *'the most precious thing this world affords'*.

The Bible isn't simply one book, but a library of 66 books, composed by some 44 writers over a period of 1500 years in a range of styles including history, poetry, prophecy, letters and apocalyptic (looking at the end times). Despite having a number of different writers, the Bible claims one author - God Himself!

As the Word of God, it is the primary way by which God speaks to us. 'All Scripture is God-breathed and is useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness, so that the man of God may be thoroughly equipped for every good work' (2 Timothy 3:16). The Bible is inspired ('the word of God in the words of men') and is a manual for life, equipping us to live for God in every aspect of our lives. We also have the promise of the Holy Spirit, who helps us to apply its words to our lives: 'But when He, the Spirit of truth, comes, He will guide you into all truth' John 16:13.

The Bible can also be described as a *love letter* from God, as it deepens our relationship with Him. Jesus said: '*You diligently study the Scriptures because you think that by them you possess eternal life. These are the Scriptures that testify about Me, yet you refuse to come to Me to have life*' (John 5:39,40). Christians follow a person not a book, and the Scriptures are intended to help us to know Jesus better. Like a signpost, the Bible points us to the person of Jesus.

#### St Mary's Pulls Out all the Stops

To mark International Organ Day on Sat 23<sup>rd</sup> April we were treated to an 'Introduction to the Organ' talk in St Mary's around the newly refurbished organ.

David Williams, ably assisted by his young helpers Luke, Andrew, Rachel and Sophie, demystified this complicated musical instrument and provided some beautiful demonstrations of playing.

Topics ranged from registration to specification to stops and manuals. We learnt about organ music and also the differences between organs across the ages and countries, and even counties!

After a wonderfully informative hour or so refreshments were provided by the social committee and members of the audience were able to 'have a go'.

#### Emmaus Village Carlton (EVC)

This is an appeal, not for your money, but for your help.

EMC has spare accommodation which the Trustees have decided to make available to Ukrainian refugees. So, they have joined up with Father David and Deacon Peter from the Catholic Parish in Olney as well as the Chellington Team ministry, part of the Sharnbrook Deanery, where a number of individuals are offering to sponsor refugees to come into their homes.

A small sub-group has been set up to support and take this project forward comprising people from Emmaus, the Chellington Team and Deacon Peter. Not all of us are in a position, for whatever reason, to sponsor refugees to come and live in our homes. But all of us will, no doubt, wish to do whatever we can to help those caught up in this terrible war.

The Emmaus team are looking for indications of support and help. We have already sourced 13 people whose applications to come and live at Emmaus are being processed. At this stage all that we are looking for is an indication of who can help, with what.

Obviously, if it so happened that anyone spoke Ukrainian, possibly Russian or Bulgarian that would be incredibly helpful. Of the 13 people coming to Emmaus only one speaks and understands English. There will be a huge need for people who are qualified to teach English as a foreign language Beyond that Carlton is served by a pretty poor bus service so offers of transport would be welcome. Refugees may need to be taken to Carlton on arrival at Bedford Station. They will need to come into Bedford to open bank accounts, register with the Department of Work and Pensions, register and visit the doctor, dentist and go to the shops.

Some of those refugees, particularly the ones in the flats at Emmaus itself, will not have their own cooking facilities and it may be helpful if people could consider cooking meals.

Perhaps you have computer skills which could help with form filling, claiming benefits and the like. Also, if you have an old smart phone at the back of some cupboard that may be very helpful.

We can expect a number of children, of all ages, will arrive with little but the clothes on their back. There will be a need for clothes, toys, simple books, play equipment, cots, pushchairs and the like. Perhaps, you may have some of these that you no longer use. Some of you might want to befriend a refugee family, invite them into your homes, show them around?

We all live busy lives and if you are able to offer any help it may only be occasional or for a short time. No offer of help will be too small not to be thankfully accepted.

At this stage all we wish to do is to find possible helpers outlining the help or skills that may be on offer. So, if you think you could help at all please contact email martinclitheroe@emmausvc.org or phone 07824859389 [If you are able to respond by email that would make processing your response easier but if that is not possible do feel free to telephone.]

Even if you not able to offer practical help do please pray for all the people of Ukraine and especially the refugees we are trying to help. **Thank you.**

#### A meal to remember!

When we gather with other Christians to celebrate the Eucharist and to make our communion, we are remembering that special meal Jesus shared with His disciples on the eve of His arrest and death. But do we always appreciate what we are doing? Sometimes the monotony of repetition and distractions will get in the way. We fail to recognise Christ's gift at communion for what it truly is.

In the 15th century the prosperous burghers of the Flemish town of Louvain commissioned the artist Dirk Bouts to paint a special altarpiece devoted to the Eucharist for the church of St Peter.



Dirk Bouts, with his imagination, portrayed the Last Supper in a room looking out to his own town of Louvain. The faces of the servers in the room and the cooks looking through the hatch were modelled on the burghers who commissioned the

work.

Other faces are modelled on theologians at the new university who visited the artist. They wanted to ensure he kept his theological feet on the ground while his imagination took flight. And so around the scene of the Last Supper, Bouts has painted Old Testament scenes foreshadowing that holy communion: Melchizedek offering bread and wine in return for Abraham's offering, the eating of the first Passover, the gathering of the manna in the wilderness, and Elijah wakened by the angel to eat and drink before setting out for Horeb. Signs of sacrifice, the Passover of the old covenant, daily food and food for the journey – all key aspects of the communion we celebrate and share in.

Just as the theological faculty reminded Dirk Bouts of all these facets, so the artist is reminding us of the richness of the distinctive meal we have as Christians. When we see the bread and wine taken up and offered, we remember not only the Last Supper, when Jesus fed His disciples with the sacrifice of His life, but those occasions when God reached out to feed His people of old. We rejoice that the food our Lord gives us in the Eucharist feeds us now and enables us to make our journey through life to the eternal banquet offered in the heavenly kingdom.






#### Thank You





Many of you know I work for a local Council, in the Council Tax Dept. Most people are aware of the £150 fuel rebate, that the government is giving people, to help with fuel costs. I've had a number of calls, at work, today, from people who have had a phone call from 'The Council', asking for bank details, so the payment can be put directly into the bank. THIS IS A SCAM TO GET YOUR BANK DETAILS! Never give any details to a 'cold caller'. Please take care not to fall for this, and warn any vulnerable people about these crooks. If you pay

by Direct Debit, the payment will be made into the bank account your DD comes from. If you don't pay by DD, but live in a band A to D property, you are still entitled to the £150. Your council will send you a cheque, through the post. If this is not cashed, after 3 months, it will be cancelled, and the £150 will be credited to your Council Tax account.

IF THE COUNCIL TAX ACCOUNT IS NOT IN ARREARS, AND THE CHEQUE IS NOT CASHED, WITHIN THE SPECIFIED TIME PERIOD, THE OPPORTUNITY TO CLAIM THIS PAYMENT WILL BE LOST. These are the government guidelines, that all councils should be following.

# Out and about on the roads? Remember the NEW Highway Code

When did you last read the Highway Code? Various 'fundamental' changes were recently made which will surely affect you.

For example, there is a new hierarchy of road users, where drivers now have new responsibilities to watch out for people who are walking, cycling, or riding a horse.



Another example is that cyclists are now advised to cycle in the *centre* of lanes in slower-moving traffic.

Finally, do you even know how best to open your car door? According to the Highway Code, you should use your hand on the opposite side to the door you are opening; for example, use your left hand to open a door on your right-hand side. This will make you turn your head to look over your shoulder. You are then more likely to avoid causing injury to cyclists or motorcyclists passing you on the road, or to people on the pavement.
